INTRODUCTION

EBP stands for evidence based practice. EBP is carried out once a method of problem-solving has been confirmed effective in improving patient care (*LibGuides: Evidence Based Practice Toolkit for Nursing*, 2021). Through extensive research and implementation of projected ways to change practice, nurses better the positive outcomes for patients throughout the entire US.

SIGNIFICANCE

Nursing is considered one of the most respected occupations (*Florence Nightingale*, 2019). Many hospitals throughout the US strive to receive Magnet status. This is an award for health institutions; when they uphold the highest standard for their nursing practice (*Magnet Recognition Program®*, 2021). An important aspect of this recognition includes implementing the use of EBP in practice.

- 8.28% of hospitals in US hold magnet status (*What is a Magnet Hospital*, 2020)
- In 2006, PA opened an EBP Center, showed 91% of eligible nurses requested to view EBP (Lavenberg, Cacchione, et. al, 2019)
- "Over 90% of nursing research leaders specified that their hospital uses EBP (Speroni, McLaughlin, et. al, 2020)."

POSITION STATEMENT

Evidence based practice is used in nursing to better deliver care to patients throughout the entire United States.

SUPPORT FOR POSITION

In the 1800s, Florence Nightingale was the pioneer who introduced the idea of EBP (*Florence Nightingale*, 2019). The basic principles that were used back then have evolved into the standards of the nursing profession today.

Nurses are responsible for using EBP in order to improve patient care and provide positive "work environment related outcomes" (Speroni, McLaughlin, et. al, 2020).

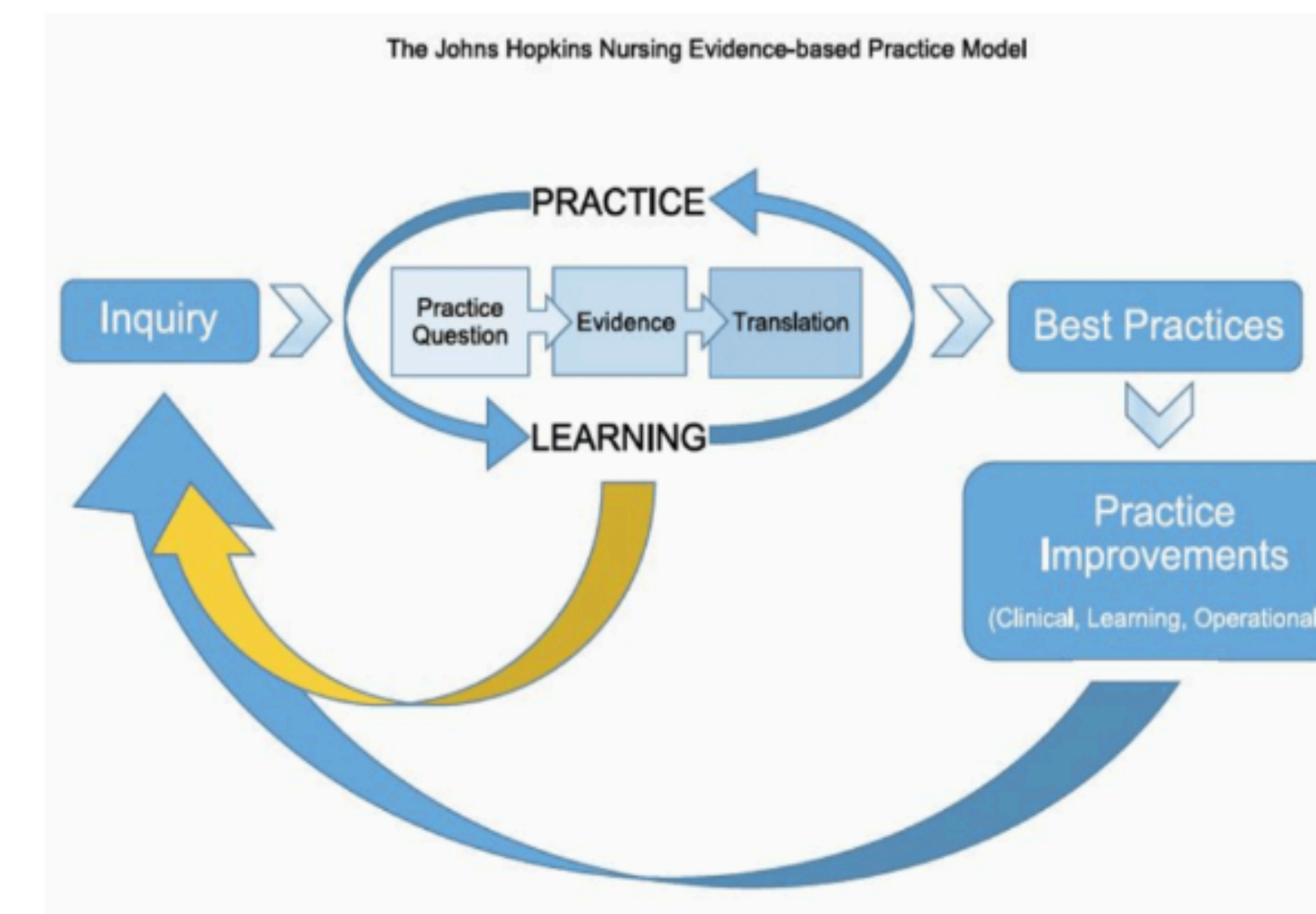
Examples of EBP used today:

- Infection Control: hand hygiene and barrier protection
 - Supplemental O₂ usage in patients with COPD
 - Noninvasive BP use for children
 - IV catheter size and blood administration plan
 - Hourly patient rounding
 - Handoff reports at shift change

EBP helps nurses determine effective guidelines for delivery of care.
