Law is a noble profession; teaching, a sublime one. A person who acts in the dual capacity of lawyer and professor, therefore, enjoys a very special dignity. Particularly is this true in the case of Attorney William J. Fahey, who will in September begin his twenty-fifth year as Professor of Business Law at College Misericordia. Preeminent among his colleagues, popular among his students, and devoted to his family, Church, community and country, Attorney Fahey has personally demonstrated to all his associates his unique ability

"Far to excel and tower above the crowd."

(Homer, Iliad, VI, 208)

A native of Kingston, and an alumnus of its public school system, Attorney Fahey received his bachelor's degree at Holy Cross College. He attended Valparaiso and Georgetown Law Schools. He received the Bachelor of Laws from Duquesne University. He has served as President of the Luzerne County Bar Association and belongs also to the Pennsylvania and American Bar Associations. A senior partner of Fahey & Casper, he is a member of the United States Court of Appeals, 3rd Circuit, and Chairman of the Clients Security Fund. He was appointed Appeal Attorney for the Reserve Draft Board #92; Panel member of the National Panel of Arbitrators, American Arbitration Association; Secretary and Chairman of the Board of Censors; and Special Deputy Attorney General for the Luzerne County Flood Control.

Enumerated in the *American Catholic Who's Who* is a long series of patriotic, civic, professional and cultural organizations in which Attorney Fahey has assumed a prominent role as officer or member: Second Lieutenant, United States Army; Solicitor, Pringle School District, Franklin and Dallas Townships, and Kingston Borough; Greater Wilkes-Barre Chamber of Commerce; Zoning and Planning Board, Kingston Borough; Black Diamond Post, American Legion; West Side Lions; and the St. Vincent de Paul Society. He is Past President of the Friends of the Library of King's College; and is currently a member of the President's Advisory Council, College Misericordia, where his two daughters have received degrees.

Reflecting upon Attorney Fahey's activities and achievements, one recalls Cicero's description of the conferences of Scaevola with his consulting clients:

Through an admirable dispensation of Divine Providence, the first year of College Misericordia's existence as an institution of higher learning witnessed the ordination of a member of the Diocese of Scranton who has since attained international renown for his distinguished achievements as a priest, scholar, administrator and educator. This young priest soon became in rapid succession Assistant Pastor, Secretary to the Bishop, Chancellor, Papal Chamberlain and Domestic Prelate. While a Monsignor, he was appointed Diocesan Consultor, Episcopal Representative for Religious, Vice Officialis, Officialis, Vicar General and Pastor of St. Peter's Cathedral.

Especially did the Sisters of Mercy and their students benefit by the fatherly counsel and prudent direction of this *alter Christus*. Subsequent to his consecration as Auxiliary Bishop of Scranton, His Excellency, Most Reverend Martin J. O'Connor, became Pastor of St. Mary's Church of the Immaculate Conception in Wilkes-Barre. His Excellency's positive spiritual influence on College Misericordia, so marked at this period, has increased steadily with the years, although papal assignment now obliges our beloved Archbishop O'Connor to reside in Rome.

A reliable connoisseur of art and a discriminating man of letters, His Excellency might well claim with Terence, "I am a human being; therefore, all that is human is of interest to me." As a Christian humanist, Archbishop O'Connor has always sought to humanize others as a completion of his own Christian culture.

With paternal concern he has for years welcomed American travelers abroad and made their visits to the Eternal City memorable experiences. His simple and gracious dignity and kindness reflect the peace suggested by his episcopal motto, cum Christo. A man of remarkable courage and determination, he bolstered the wavering economy of Italy in a depressing post-war period. Consequently, he was declared Grand Officer of the Order of Merit of the Republic of Italy. This noble citizen, formerly of Scranton, now of the United States, is a personification of the Church in America: his ordained sons preach and teach in every diocese of our continent and radiate dynamic spiritual energy and disciplined zeal throughout all of its parishes. A valiant supporter of the church militant, Archbishop O'Connor's labors for the Vatican Council II have reflected indefatigable industry and heroic dedication.

An eminent ecclesiastic, His Excellency has been selected by recent Pontiffs for many responsible positions: Titular Bishop of Thespia and Auxiliary Bishop of Scranton; Rector North American College; Titular Archbishop of Laodicea in Syria; Assistant at the Pontifical Throne; Consultor of the Sacred Congregation for Seminaries and Universities; President, Pontifical Commission for Motion Pictures, Radio and Television; Member of Episcopal Committee for the North American College; Consultor of Sacred Congregation de Propaganda Fide; President of the Secretariat for Communication Media in preparation for the Ecumenical Council; Member of the Central Preparatory Commission for II Vatican Council; Vice President of X Conciliar Commission for the II Ecumenical Vatican Council; President of Committee for Press relations for the II Ecumenical Vatican Council. By the Motu proprio, In Fructibus, just published, April 7, by Pope Paul VI, Archbishop O'Connor became the Prefect of the Pontifical Commission for Mass Media.

It is fitting, therefore, that College Misericordia at the completion of this fourth decade of its progress should honor Archbishop O'Connor whose priestly career so brilliantly exhibits the profound wisdom of the Christlike scholar and teacher, the efficient genius of the practical administrator, the sagacious builder for time and eternity.

PRESENTATION OF MERCY AWARD TO MR. JOHN J. McSWEENEY

The bi-directional flow of mercy has been observed by the poet whose 400th anniversary is celebrated this year:

"It blesseth him that gives and him that takes."
(Shakespeare, Merchant of Venice)

Through the apostolate of the pen, the editor of the Wilkes-Barre Times-Leader, The Evening News, Mr. John J. McSweeney illustrates this fact in a unique way. His expressed loyalty to the Sisters of Mercy and his constant fidelity to their ideals of service to God and neighbor reflect the spirit of mercy which issues from his facile pen to the benefit of all residents of Wyoming Valley and indeed of all persons everywhere who are readers of his excellent newspaper.

As the eminent French author and diplomat, Paul Claudel, Mr. McSweeney realizes:

"Mercy is not a gift from one's superfluous possessions; it is a passion like the desire for knowledge."

(La Maison Fermee)

Imbued with indefatigable zeal for his high calling, Claudel has actually anticipated the laudable desire of our honored and beloved editor:

"Grant that I may produce the best substance of my heart in an abundant harvest, even if some stalks crop up outside the field, right out in the middle of the road. I would be a sower of God's seed. Just as a tiny grain thrown into the earth germinates, blossoms and fructifies, so does the word stir the intelligence. Grant that I may be the sower of solitude and that he who hears my word may be roused to stimulating and serious reflection."

(La Maison Fermee)

The record of Mr. McSweeney's life has been one of quiet, humble but steady and solid achievement. From the age of twenty-one, as city and managing editor of *The Evening News* and later as editor of that paper, and as editor of the *Times-Leader*, *The Evening News*, Mr. McSweeney has attracted world wide attention. His Little Studies column, published daily since 1924, reveals the choice quality of his writing, his rare intellectual discernment, his keen analysis of problems, his original interpretation of events and his admirable philosophy of life. Through the medium of the spoken as well as the written word, his influence has been extended. He inaugurated the broadcasting of local news in Wilkes-Barre in 1929 and still edits the noon programs for three local radio stations.

Mr. McSweeney's distinguished editorial activity has not been restricted to Wyoming Valley. He is on the staff of the United States Information Service. He has represented United Press International in Luzerne County since 1924. He was correspondent for the Associated Press in the 1920's and for twenty-five years served as correspondent for the New York Times in Luzerne County and Eastern Pennsylvania. He has also been correspondent for the Evening Ledger, Philadelphia, and contributing editor to other newspapers in New York, Philadelphia, Chicago and Baltimore. Many of his stories have appeared in newspapers throughout the world.

Impressive is the long series of grateful tributes to Mr. McSweeney's editorial prowess: from the College of Cardinals, several individual American Cardinals and other members of the hierarchy; from General MacArthur, General Gruenther, Bernard Baruch, President Hoover and President and Mrs. Kennedy. Citations and awards have been conferred upon him by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the State Department of Commerce, the U. S. Treasury Department, the Pennsylvania State University and a host of other organizations too numerous to mention. For service in the cause of freedom he was honored by the President of Free Poland and the Polish National Alliance. Besides a long list of societies to which Mr. McSweeney belongs, he is a member of the Governor's Commission for the Revision of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and of the Citizens' Conference for the Modernization of the Courts of Pennsylvania. He has served as director of the Wilkes-Barre Chamber of Commerce and the Wyoming Valley Council of Boy Scouts.

Despite his international renown, he is still recognized by many simply as the father of two Misericordia graduates. Each member of his family and each of his acquaintances can describe him in the words of Bassanio, as

"The dearest friend to me, the kindest man,
The best conditioned and unwearied spirit
In doing courtesies." (Shakespeare, Merchant of Venice)

Wherefore, as the formal acknowledgment of his staunch support of the Sisters of Mercy and as a recognition of his brilliant talents so generously and effectively dedicated to the enlightened professional service of his fellow citizens, and as an enduring expression of our honor, esteem, appreciation and affection, the President, Dean and Faculty of College Misericordia now proudly and enthusiastically present this well-merited Mercy Award to Mr. John J. McSweeney.
