EDWARD JOSEPH CONNORS DOCTOR OF LAWS, HONORIS CAUSA

College Misericordia has chosen to honor Edward Joseph Connors for his distinctive achievements in the field of health service through a life-time of dedication to training health-care providers and public health administrators.

A native of Sioux City, Iowa, Edward Connors earned his Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics at the University of South Dakota, and his Master of Health Administration degree from the University of Minnesota. His professional teaching career began at the University of Michigan, School of Public Health, and included teaching in the Department of Preventive Medicine at the University of Wisconsin, as well as Graduate teaching at the University of Chicago. He also served as Superintendent of University Hospitals at the University of Wisconsin and later as Director of University Hospital in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Early in his career, Professor Connors engaged in scholarly research; with the support of the Kellogg Foundation he became Project Director for studies of Progressive Patient Care, of Extended Care Units in General Hospitals, of Nursing Homes, of Hospital and Medical Economics. His published works number more than 25 articles in professional health journals, each title attesting to his growing concern for the care of the sick and the needy.

In 1974 Edward Connors became Consultant to the Sisters of Mercy, Province of Detroit, as they assessed their health services through a Professional Standards Review. Studies of the Detroit Mercy Multi-Institutional Health Systems led to his appointment, in 1976, as President of the Detroit Mercy Health Corporation, and his present position of service as President of Mercy Health Services, Farmington Hills, Michigan.

Concern for issues of Public Health and Mercy Health Care Services have involved Edward Connors in dozens of service roles in local, state, and national health organizations. He is an active member of The American Hospital Association, having served on a number of its committees, and is currently Chairman-Elect Designate of that group; he is active also in The Catholic Hospital Association and has served on state hospital associations in Wisconsin, Michigan, and, on a local level, in the Greater Detroit Area. His role of voluntary service includes many Executive Boards, Boards of Directors and Boards of Trustees, most recently at Mercy College in Detroit. In the past five years in seventeen states, he has spoken about the changing impact of delivering health services to the poor, addressing groups of hospital administrators and leaders of religious congregations engaged in sponsoring and providing health care.

College Misericordia today presents to Edward Joseph Connors the degree of Doctor of Laws, in recognition of his professional life concern: calling public attention to those in need of health services. He has done it through teaching, through published writing, through public speaking, through professional directing of multi-hospital health systems. He has sought to improve quality of life, not just in a city, not just in a state, not just in a nation, but in the special life each needy person lives.

HELEN AMOS, RSM DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERS, HONORIS CAUSA

Sister Helen Amos, RSM, has been chosen to receive an honorary degree from College Misericordia in recognition of her outstanding achievement as a leader among women religious on a national level. She is currently the President of the 4,000-member congregation of religious women known as the Religious Sisters of Mercy of the Union of America. Her canonical jurisdiction includes nine provinces of the Mercy Order, each with Province Offices in Baltimore, Chicago, Cincinnati, Detroit, New York, Omaha, Providence, St. Louis, Scranton, as well as the Mercy missions throughout the Caribbean, Central and South America.

A native of Mobile, Alabama, Helen Amos entered the congregation of the Religious Sisters of Mercy in Baltimore, Maryland, in 1956. She received a degree in mathematics at a Mercy college, Mount Saint Agnes College in Baltimore. While teaching first in Savannah, Georgia, and then in Atlanta, she began the study of Educational Administration at the University of Georgia. Her Master's degree in mathematics was earned at the University of Notre Dame, South Bend, Indiana, in 1963. By 1970 she had begun to interweave the two major educational thrusts of her life — mathematics and administration — into the one major dedication of her life — the corporal and spiritual works of the Religious Sisters of Mercy.

Helen Amos served as Registrar at Mount Saint Agnes College; after the College closed in 1970, she became Assistant Registrar at Loyola University in Baltimore at the same time she took on the job of Director of Finance for the Baltimore Mercy Province. For six years she performed administrative duties for both the Baltimore Province and the diocese of Baltimore where she held the office of Director of Personnel. In 1979 Helen Amos was elected Provincial Administrator of the Baltimore Mercy Sisters and in 1984, she was chosen to lead all the Sisters of Mercy in the United States as their elected President. Three weeks ago, on April 27, 1988, Sister Helen Amos was unanimously acclaimed President of the Sisters of Mercy for a second term, 1988-1992.

Early in life Helen Amos witnessed the deep dedication of the Sisters of Mercy she knew throughout the southern states; she saw them caring for the poor in Alabama, caring for the sick in Maryland and Georgia, caring very much everywhere for those whose intellectual needs called, perhaps, for the greatest caring of all through elementary and secondary diocesan schools to even the higher levels of education in colleges and universities. And because she understood that Mercy and Justice come about only through caring, she committed her life to goals of the Sisters of Mercy. Under her leadership, three weeks ago, the 4,000 Religious Sisters of Mercy of the Union voted to join the 5,000-member Federation of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas in order to combine resources for strengthening their corporate and personal commitment to the ideal of Catherine McAuley: "The care of the poor, the sick, the uneducated."

College Misericordia is proud to acknowledge the quiet achievements of Sister Helen Amos, a mathematician who cares about people, an administrator whose concern is taking great risks that will bring about even greater results, a Religious Sister of Mercy who, like Catherine McAuley, leads her community through difficult times to a wholly new future.

THOMAS P. SHELBURNE DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERS, HONORIS CAUSA

Thomas P. Shelburne has been chosen by College Misericordia to receive an honorary degree because of his outstanding record of public service in commerce and industry within the local community.

A native of Prince Edward County, Virginia, Thomas Shelburne earned a Bachelor of Arts degree at Hampton Sydney College, Virginia, and a Master of Arts at the College of William and Mary.

Although he began his professional career as a high-school principal in Virginia, it was his work with the United States Office of Price Administration in Washington, D.C., and the acquaintances he met there that led to his life-long interest in the power of communication through public media: newspaper, radio, television. He came to Wilkes-Barre to help form a radio station, WILK. From that point on, the expansion of communications media and the consequent economic development of Northeastern Pennsylvania became major concerns in the life of Thomas Shelburne.

Mr. Shelburne's interest in communications led to his public involvement as co-founder, stockholder, station manager, Executive Vice-President, and Chief Executive Officer respectively, of a pioneer TV station, WILK-TV, Channel 34, of the well-established Channel 16, WNEP-TV, of the Public Broadcasting System WVIA-TV, and, finally, as President of Northeastern Pennsylvania Communications, Inc. It was for that work that he was honored in 1987 by the Northeastern Business Hall of Fame whose aim is to acknowledge and award business leaders who have enriched the community with their activities.

Mr. Shelburne's dedication to public service and civic causes has involved him in leadership roles on Boards of Directors and Committees, often as Chairman or President, for the United Way, the Luzerne-Lackawanna Environmental Council, the Economic Development Council, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Image Committee, the Executive Committee of HSA, the Northeast Pennsylvania Marketing Committee, the Pennsylvania State Advisory Transportation Committee, and Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Chambers of Commerce.

He has been involved in education and health-care as both college and hospital trustee, and in local cultural activities as Past President of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Philharmonic Society.

A person whose talents have been for organization and whose concern has been for public service, Thomas Shelburne has been designated Northeastern Pennsylvania Man of the Year, Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Pennsylvanian, and listed in *Who's Who In The East*, 1987. College Misericordia today recognizes the commitment to public service, the dedication to civic and cultural concerns, the varied leadership roles in the community that truly distinguish Thomas P. Shelburne as a worthy recipient of an Honorary Degree.

MARGARET HUSIC SPENGLER

Margaret Husic graduated from College Misericordia in 1936 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Home Economics. Misericordia was a very small school with a very large vision of a woman's place in the world: a vision of women as influence, of women as leaders. Today in 1988, College Misericordia recognizes in Margaret Husic Spengler a woman whose own vision and influence have gone out from this high hill to change the lives of women in other parts of the country, and on the other side of the world.

When Margaret speaks of her days here as a student, she speaks not of academic subjects and grade point averages; rather, she speaks of the Religious Sisters of Mercy who influenced her so deeply, especially Mother Catharine McGann, first Academic Dean of the College. It was the Sisters on the faculty who first spoke a name Margaret Husic was to remember for more than 50 years, the name of another Sister Catherine, Catherine McAuley of Dublin, Ireland, founder of the Sisters of Mercy in 1831. Margaret understood that the Sisters on the College faculty were inspired to educate women in particular according to their founder's vision of service and compassion. For Margaret, receiving a degree from Misericordia was the first step in learning how to influence one's own world and how to preserve one's own vision of merciful compassion through voluntary service: to the state of Massachusetts, to the town of Arlington where she lives, and to the Alumni Association of her College.

Margaret Husic Spengler has received the University of Massachusetts Governor's Civic Award for her work on the State Board of Higher Education, the Department of Education Committee on Racial Imbalance, the Attorney General's Advisory Committee on Judicial Crime. In her home town of Arlington she has been awarded the Teachers Association Citation for work on the Board of Public Welfare, the Board of Library Trustees and the Board of Directors Department of Youth Services.

It is, however, as a member of the Alumni that Margaret Husic Spengler has carried forth into her world the vision of her teachers, of their founder. As former President of the College Misericordia Alumni Association, she has permanently influenced graduating classes by her own example of voluntary service. In 1985 she became the first official Alumni representative to the Board of Trustees at College Misericordia, serving as a liaison between the Alumni Association and the Board.

The mother of five sons, Margaret is married to Kenneth Spengler, executive director of the American Meteorological Society, Boston.

Therefore, when the World Meteorological Society held its meeting in Beijing, China, it was Margaret Husic Spengler who influenced the Communist Chinese government to send to College Misericordia two young meteorologists, Junxue Zhang and Xaio Mai Zheng. Her vision of their world led her to bring them to a vision of her world, to the Catholic College where that vision first took tangible form.

College Misericordia is proud to present the Catherine McAuley Medal for "compassion" and for "service" to a most worthy Alumna, Margaret Husic Spengler. She remembered the Sisters of Mercy who taught her in this College; most of all, she shared their vision of compassionate service.
