

Class of 2015

At the 89th annual Commencement, the members of the Class of 2015 will make history as participants in the first dual ceremonies. The program will honor graduate and undergraduate students separately at morning and afternoon events.

The graduate ceremony will recognize 105 graduates who hail from 10 states, including Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Illinois, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania and Virginia.

The 44 speech-language and pathology students represent the largest number of graduate degree recipients from a single graduate degree program, followed by 30 Master of Science degree students in occupational therapy, and 20 in the organizational management program.

The undergraduate Commencement ceremony will acknowledge 249 students from eight states, including Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Maryland, Montana, New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania.

The program with the largest number of graduates from a single major at the undergraduate ceremony is the nursing program. Fifty-three students are earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing. The next two most populous majors are business administration with 36 students receiving undergraduate degrees, and psychology with 18 degree recipients.

Today's Commencement is one of numerous events held throughout the year at which Misericordia is celebrating its 90th Anniversary and paying homage to the Religious Sisters of Mercy who founded Misericordia as Luzerne County's first four-year institution of higher learning in 1924. We honor the Sisters of Mercy by sending forth graduates who understand and embrace the charisms of Mercy, Service, Justice and Hospitality.

Misericordia University is proud of the Class of 2015 and we wish our graduates well as they prepare to enter the next important phase of their lives. MU's newest alumni understand and embrace what makes Misericordia special and will always be Misericordia Proud.

W. Scott Blanchard, Ph.D.

W. Scott Blanchard, Ph.D., professor of English, was selected to offer the keynote address at the inaugural graduate Commencement ceremony as the recipient of the 2014 Louis and Barbara Alesi Excellence in Scholarship Award at Misericordia University. The annual award recognizes and promotes the academic accomplishments of faculty members in terms of



their scholarship and/or artistic achievements. The Faculty Awards Committee makes the selection.

A faculty member in the English Department at Misericordia University since 1991, Dr. Blanchard holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Middlebury College, Middlebury, Vt., and a doctoral degree from Columbia University, New York, N.Y. He has been published widely and has made numerous presentations in the fields of Italian humanism and European literature.

Dr. Blanchard, along with Jeroen De Keyser, Ph.D., a research fellow at the Catholic University of Leuven in Belgium, published an English translation and Latin edition of "On Exile" by Italian humanist Francesco Filelfo (1398-1481), as part of The I Tatti Renaissance Library Series from Harvard University Press. The book was released in March 2013. The 15th century dialogue on exile was written by Fifelfo on behalf of the exiled Florentine aristocrats forced out of Florence in 1434 at the rise of Cosimo de' Medici. "On Exile" is the first complete edition of the Latin text and the first complete translation into any modern language. Dr. Keyser prepared the Latin text, while Dr. Blanchard prepared the translation.

A research paper he wrote about Fifelfo and his views on the ethics of world citizenship was published in Renaissance Quarterly in 2007. Dr. Blanchard's talk is partly based on a forthcoming publication focused on the economic and theological ideas that 13th century Spiritual Franciscans developed in relation to the pursuit of "the deepest form of poverty," notions relevant to some of the Critical Concerns of the Sisters of Mercy and to the emerging ecology of sustainability.





Andrea Payne

The Honorary Alumna Award honors individuals who are not graduates of Misericordia University yet have made significant contributions toward its welfare, reputation or prestige and have shown lifelong devotion and demonstrated loyalty. The award is give only when the Alumni Association wishes to honor an exceptional person.



Misericordia University has been such an important thread in the life of Andrea Payne that she has held many family celebrations on campus. The wife of the late David M. Payne, professor emeritus and former dean of admissions, Mrs. Payne is proud to say that their five children grew up on campus, all graduated from Misericordia, and their daughter, Ellen McLaughlin '86, Ed.D., OTR/L, serves as a valued faculty member and director of the Occupational Therapy Doctoral Program. In 2006, their son David M. Payne, Jr., '85, presented the Academic Convocation address and received an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree. Two of their granddaughters attend or have attended Misericordia in Speech-Language Pathology, Brianna McLaughlin '12, and Sarah Payne '18. Mrs. Payne has eight grandchildren and one greatgrandson.

Mrs. Payne's history began at Misericordia in 1967 when David joined the Department of English faculty. With five children under the age of seven in tow, she remembers being warmly welcomed by the Sisters of Mercy as soon as they arrived on campus. When the Agnes Flood devastated their Wilkes-Barre home in 1972, the college's president, Sister Miriam Teresa O'Donnell, RSM, offered them a house to live in on Lake Street. Mrs. Payne says she was overwhelmed by this kindness and knew then that Misericordia would always be home.

As Professor Payne moved through the ranks as chair of the Department of English, chair of the humanities division, director of admissions, and dean of admissions and financial aid, the students on the intimate campus knew the family well and the Payne household became the place where students felt welcome and would go to visit, ask advice, babysit the children or simply "help out or hang out."

A stalwart supporter of the Mercy community, she and her husband worked closely with Monsignor John Bendik, then-campus chaplain, to establish pre-Cana classes for the Diocese of Scranton, which were held on campus for several years. Mrs. Payne participated in the plans for the reorganization of the Mercy Associates Program in 1989-90 and became one of its first members.

Working with the Sisters of Mercy, she helped organize the first Mom Walk at the Catherine McAuley House and encouraged support of the Adopt-a-Family Program. In 2012, Mrs. Payne was named the Woman of the Year by the Sisters of Mercy and honored at their annual Mercy Golf Classic, which benefits the Catherine McAuley Center and its ministries.

Professor and Mrs. Payne showed their gratitude toward Misericordia by establishing a scholarship in 1982 in the name of her parents, Walter and Catherine Janasie. A second scholarship in Professor Payne's memory was established after his death in 2004, recognizing his 37 years of service to Misericordia, and his love for the school and its students.

Rosemary Sigmond

Rosemary Sigmond, a revered member of the Board of Trustees since 1994 and a Mercy Associate, will receive the Catherine McAuley Medal – Misericordia University's highest honor. The award recognizes significant service to the University and the values to which it aspires. A stalwart University supporter, she served as vice chair of the Board of Trustees from 2001-06 and established the Rosemary A.



Sigmond Scholarship in Business, which is bestowed annually upon an academically- and financially-deserving student at Misericordia University who plans to major in business or accounting.

Ms. Sigmond chaired the University's Marketing and Development Committee for many years, and remains a member of the committee. She also was instrumental in renovating the campus chapel in Mercy Hall. In addition, she served as the liaison for the Board of Trustees to the Ethics Institute of Northeastern Pennsylvania at Misericordia University. In recognition of her efforts and service, the Sisters of Mercy named her the Woman of the Year in 2000.

Ms. Sigmond also has been widely recognized for her service to the community. She is the 1994 recipient of the Athena Award, presented by the Greater Wilkes-Barre Chamber of Commerce. This honor is presented to a person who has attained and personified the highest level of professional excellence in his/her business or profession, has devoted time and energy to the community in a meaningful way, and most especially, has generously assisted women in attaining their full potential. Also, she received the 1996 Woman of the Year Award from the West Side-Kingston Business and Professional Women's Club; the 1996 Woman of the Year Award of the Wyoming Valley Women's Club, and the Northeastern Pennsylvania Environmental Partnership Award in 1999.

Prior to her retirement in 1997, Ms. Sigmond was vice-president and owner of Coon Industries, Inc., and secretary and owner of Pikes Creek Sand and Stone, Inc. She was the first woman elected to Luzerne Borough Council as president. She served in that capacity for several years.



Sister Eileen M. Campbell, RSM

Sister Eileen M. Campbell, RSM, is vice president of the Institute of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, and has dedicated her life to making the world a better place by taking a leadership role to fight some of the toughest social justice issues of the day. Her mission has taken her to areas of need around the world.



In her second term on the leadership team of the Institute

of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, her areas of responsibility include addressing justice issues, anti-racism work, and the creation of an inter-Congregational Collaborative Leadership Development Initiative and Program for younger and newer vowed religious women.

She previously served for 10 years as executive director of Mercy Volunteer Corps (MVC), an international volunteer program sponsored by the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas. As executive director, she prepared and managed a \$500,000 budget; directed communications with 25 Sisters of Mercy Regional Communities throughout the U.S., and oversaw program and policy development to enhance the MVC mission. During her tenure, the MVC program expanded to include international service sites in Guyana, South America, and Honduras and Guatemala, Central America.

During the previous six years, Sister Campbell was administrator of Mercy Hospice in Philadelphia, Pa., a residency program serving more than 2,200 homeless women and children annually. She also served as administrator for Women of Hope, which consists of two boarding home facilities in Philadelphia for chronically mentally ill women who are homeless. Sister Campbell was a member of the Cranaleith Spiritual Center advisory board for 10 years. Currently, she serves on two planning committees for the Leadership Conference for Women Religious.

A resident of Silver Spring, Md., Sister Campbell earned her bachelor's degree in education from Gwynedd-Mercy College, Gwynedd Valley, Pa., and her master's degree in education from Fordham University, Bronx, N.Y.

During the undergraduate Commencement ceremony, Misericordia University will present Sister Campbell with her second honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree. She received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from Gwynedd-Mercy College in 2005.





Sandy Insalaco, Sr.

Sandy Insalaco, Sr., a valued member and former chair of the Misericordia University Board of Trustees, is chairman of the board and CEO of Nature's Way Purewater Systems, Inc., Pittston, Pa., and a principal in Insalaco Development Group, which owns and manages commercial real estate in New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. He is chairman of the board of Landmark Community Bank, Pittston. He is also the former general manager



and chief financial officer of Insalaco Supermarkets and former chairman of the board of directors of Affiliated Food Distributors.

A member of the Misericordia University Board of Trustees since 1998, Mr. Insalaco was instrumental in establishing the Insalaco Center for Career Development. Having worked closely with high school and college students who worked at the family's supermarkets, he learned there was an educational void in the region that needed to be filled to ensure future success for the students. Since its inception, the Insalaco Center for Career Development has helped prepare thousands of Misericordia students for employment or graduate school, and provided support for managing their careers.

Mr. Insalaco and his wife, Marlene, also have been recognized for being the lead donors in the campaign that led to the construction of a new academic building on campus. The couple was awarded the Founder's Medal in 2006 for their philanthropy. The 28,500-square-foot, technology smart Sandy and Marlene Insalaco Hall was dedicated in their honor in 2009. He was given emeriti status on the Board of Trustees in June 2014.

Mr. Insalaco also received the McGowan Cornerstone Award in 2010 for his work as founder and chair of the Monsignor Andrew J.

McGowan Cornerstone Committee, a group dedicated to continuing the beloved clergyman's legacy of service. Monsignor Andrew J.

McGowan was well-known throughout Northeastern Pennsylvania as an academic supporter and leader in the community.

American academic dress has its origins in the garments worn at medieval British universities, particularly at Oxford, which was founded in the 12th century. At the time, academic institutions were similar to guilds or associations, called universitates. The academic organization was a guild of Masters of Arts, with the bachelor an apprentice.

Gowns and hoods were common clothing in medieval times, with quality and design decreed according to the wearer's social status and wealth. While general fashions changed, academic attire remained the same, both as a tradition and as a means of identifying members of the university. Hoods evolved from a simple head covering or cowl into a symbolic garment with a strictly assigned system of colors and patterns which identified each graduate's institution, rank, and discipline.

The Oxford or "mortar board" cap came into use during the 16th century, but authorities differ on its origin. Some say the cap is square like a scholar's books; others that it was derived from the master workman's mortar board; still others suggest it was patterned after the quadrangular shape of the Oxford campus. A more plausible explanation is that the scholars wore skull caps while they worked indoors and square caps called birettas when they went outdoors; if they simply donned the biretta over their skull cap, the look would be very much like the mortarboard.

Although caps and gowns had been worn in many American schools since Colonial times, in 1885 there was a widespread student movement for their use at commencement ceremonies. The faculties adopted the use of gowns for themselves to wear at academic ceremonies. Each college developed its own arbitrary design and standards, as the British universities had, until the Intercollegiate Commission met to develop a code for academic costume in 1895. The new code regulated design of gowns, hoods, and colors in a way that would signify each scholar's achievements and institution. It was approved by 95 percent of American universities and colleges, and is still in use today.

The official code provides for three types of gowns. Those worn by the bachelors are black and have long, pointed sleeves. Masters may wear either black silk or woolen gowns, made with a long closed sleeve with an arc appearing near the bottom and a slit for the arm. The doctors' gowns are usually of black silk with full, round, open sleeves. The color of the velvet trim may be black or the same color as the velvet which edges the hood. Although the color is normally black, some institutions have authorized doctoral gowns in their school colors.

The hood is worn at the back, suspended near the shoulders. The length of the hood and the width of its velvet border indicate the level of the degree held. Bachelors wear a hood which is three feet long, with a two-inch velvet border. The hood for the master's degree is three and one-half feet long, with a three-inch border. The doctor's hood is four feet long and the border is five inches wide.

The inner lining of the hood is in the official color or colors of the institution conferring the degree; therefore, Misericordia University's hood is lined with blue and golden yellow. The color of the velvet border indicates the field of learning in which the degree was earned. Tassels are traditionally black for the bachelor's and master's degrees, and gold for doctor's degrees and the governing officers of educational institutions.

Additional ornaments have been added in some institutions to indicate honors or memberships in honor societies. At Misericordia, a gold stole is worn by graduates receiving University honors; colored cords draped over the robe indicate membership in an honor society; distinctive pins worn on the gown also indicate particular honors.


The mace is made of black walnut and bronze. The dark, rich wood symbolizes the woodlands surrounding the University campus referred to in the Alma Mater.

The unusual shaft works its way from rough cast, difficult beginnings into the textured, polished finish of a double base—angled, yet harmoniously fitted. The form represents the structured ideals of the Sisters of Mercy liberal arts education and the individual struggles for acquisition of knowledge.

Open, free forms of brass represent the open, free spirit, which is the basis of Compassionate Service, while the rich beauty and strength of walnut depict the fullness, value, and strength of Judeo-Christian education.

Highlighting the head of the mace is gleaming, textured bronze in the shape of an open flame. The fire represents two events in the history of the University: the burning of St. Mary's Convent in Wilkes-Barre, which necessitated the Sisters' move to Dallas, and the first night on campus when fires almost prevented the University from ever opening its doors. A flame open to searching for truth, and open to new ideas is symbolic of the light of learning: always striving for, never reaching, the fullness of finish.

The University Mace was designed and executed by Regina Keil, RSM, goldsmith and silversmith. It is a gift of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, Dallas Regional Community.



Misericordia University was founded by the Sisters of Mercy.

The flags on the Commencement stage today represent the countries where the Sisters of Mercy, faculty and students from Misericordia University have ministered. Also included are the flags of our graduates who are from foreign countries. The United Nations flag represents the Sisters of Mercy's NGO (Non-Governmental Organization) status.


