

## Class of 2019

The ninth annual Misericordia University Winter Commencement Ceremony recognizes the accomplishments of 249 graduates who hail from 10 states, including Arizona, Connecticut, Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Virginia, and Vermont.

Among the academic programs with the most graduates, the College of Health Sciences and Education has 43 students graduating from the six-and-a-half-year Doctor of Physical Therapy program. In addition, 25 students will receive their Bachelor of Science in Nursing degrees, and four will be awarded a Doctor of Nursing Practice. Also within the college, the Department of Occupational Therapy will award 23 Master of Science in Occupational Therapy degrees and four Doctor of Occupational Therapy degrees. In the College of Business, the largest contingent includes 32 students who will receive Bachelor of Science degrees in business administration. In the College of Arts and Sciences, psychology and biology have the most graduates, presenting 13 and 10 candidates respectively.

The University has a rich 95-year tradition of preparing graduates to succeed in life and in their chosen field of study by providing them with individualized attention, challenging academics, and superb career preparation, while also imbuing in each student a passion to serve others. ## G. Jonathan Greenwald



G. Jonathan Greenwald is a career U.S. diplomat and retired specialist in international law and conflict prevention. A Kingston, Pa., native who holds degrees from Princeton University and the Harvard School of Law, Greenwald retired from the State Department in 1998 as minister-counselor of the U.S. Mission to the European Union.

His 30-year career included posts in Belgrade, Budapest, Madrid, West Berlin, and East Berlin, where his focus was

on transatlantic relations, European Union, the Middle East and terrorism. During his time in East Berlin, he was the U.S. Embassy's political counselor as the Berlin Wall fell and Germany reunited. He served on U.S. delegations to the United Nations General Assembly and the international conferences that drafted, then reviewed, the Helsinki Final Act on Security and Cooperation in Europe. He also held important positions in the U.S. State Department's legal, intelligence, human rights, counter-terrorism, and European bureaus.

From 2006-17, Greenwald also served pro bono as the U.S. State Department-designated member of the commission created by a U.S.-Austria agreement to adjudicate some 21,000 Holocaust-era claims on behalf of the Austrian National Fund for Victims of National Socialism. In recognition of his exemplary service, Austria conferred on him its High Honor Award with Star for Services to the Republic.

In addition, he served as vice president of the International Crisis Group, a leading non-governmental conflict prevention organization. There, he supervised research and worked with project directors around the world to maintain a stream of targeted reports and briefing papers on the range of crises and subjects that Crisis Group covers.

As a member of the Board of Trustees and 1960 graduate of Wyoming Seminary College Preparatory School in Kingston, he initiated a unique partnership between the Givat Haviva International School in Israel and the Schule Schloss Salem boarding school in Germany to bring Israeli and Palestinian students together to study. The goal is to strengthen collaboration that can support a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

He has taught diplomacy at Lawrence University, Appleton, Wis., and conflict prevention, counter-terrorism, and European and Middle East politics at Lawrence summer programs and the Jackson School of International Studies at the University of Washington, Seattle. He also led a seminar on Iran and the U.S. that focused on their nuclear negotiations at the Central European University's School of Public Policy in Budapest, Hungary, and coordinated foreign policy issues for U.S. Sen. Bill Bradley's presidential campaign. He is also author of the book, "Berlin Witness: An American Diplomat's Chronicle of East Germany's Revolution."

He is a member of the U.S. Council on Foreign Relations, the Washington Institute of Foreign Affairs, the American Foreign Service Association, the Democratic Party's National Finance Committee, the leadership councils of Foreign Policy4America and J Street, and the Boards of the Institute for Integrated Transitions, Barcelona and the Balkans Policy Research Group.

HISTORY White American academic dress has its origins in the garments worn at medieval British universities, particularly at Oxford, which was founded in the 12th century. At the time, academic institutions were similar to guilds or associations, called *universitates*. The academic organization was a guild of Masters of Arts, with the bachelor an apprentice.

Gowns and hoods were common clothing in medieval times, with quality and design decreed according to the wearer's social status and wealth. While general fashions changed, academic attire remained the same, both as a tradition and as a means of identifying members of the university. Hoods evolved from a simple head covering or cowl into a symbolic garment with a strictly assigned system of colors and patterns which identified each graduate's institution, rank, and discipline.

The Oxford or "mortar board" cap came into use during the 16th century, but authorities differ on its origin. Some say the cap is square like a scholar's books; others that it was derived from the master workman's mortar board; still others suggest it was patterned after the quadrangular shape of the Oxford campus. A more plausible explanation is that the scholars wore skull caps while they worked indoors and square caps called birettas when they went outdoors; if they simply donned the biretta over their skull cap, the look would be very much like the mortarboard.

Although caps and gowns had been worn in many American schools since Colonial times, in 1885 there was a widespread student movement for their use at commencement ceremonies. The faculties adopted the use of gowns for themselves to wear at academic ceremonies. Each college developed its own design and standards, as the British universities had, until the Intercollegiate Commission met to develop a code for academic costume in 1895. The new code regulated design of gowns, hoods, and colors in a way that would signify each scholar's achievements and institution. It was approved by 95 percent of American universities and colleges, and is still in use today.

The official code provides for three types of gowns. Those worn by the bachelors are black and have long, pointed sleeves. Masters may wear either black silk or woolen gowns, made with a long closed sleeve with an arc appearing near the bottom and a slit for the arm. The doctors' gowns are usually of black silk with full, round, open sleeves. The color of the velvet trim

may be black or the same color as the velvet which edges the hood. Although the color is normally black, some institutions have authorized doctoral gowns in their school colors.

The hood is worn at the back, suspended near the shoulders. The length of the hood and the width of its velvet border indicate the level of the degree held. Bachelors wear a hood which is three feet long, with a two-inch velvet border. The hood for the master's degree is three and one-half feet long, with a three-inch border. The doctor's hood is four feet long and the border is five inches wide.

The inner lining of the hood is in the official color or colors of the institution conferring the degree; therefore, Misericordia University's hood is lined with blue and golden yellow. The color of the velvet border indicates the field of learning in which the degree was earned. Tassels are traditionally black for the bachelor's and master's degrees, and gold for doctor's degrees and the governing officers of educational institutions.

Additional ornaments have been added in some institutions to indicate honors or memberships in honor societies. At Misericordia, a gold stole is worn by graduates receiving University honors; colored cords draped over the robe indicate membership in an honor society; distinctive pins worn on the gown also indicate particular honors.




The unusual shaft works its way from rough cast, signifying difficult beginnings, into the textured, polished finish of a double base—angled, yet harmoniously fitted. The form represents the structured ideals of the Sisters of Mercy liberal arts education and the individual struggles for acquisition of knowledge.

Open, free forms of brass represent the open, free spirit, which is the basis of Compassionate Service, while the rich beauty and strength of walnut depict the fullness, value, and strength of Judeo-Christian education.

Highlighting the head of the mace is gleaming, textured bronze in the shape of an open flame. The fire represents two events in the history of the University: the burning of St. Mary's Convent in Wilkes-Barre, which necessitated the Sisters' move to Dallas, and the first night on campus when fires almost prevented the University from ever opening its doors. A flame open to searching for truth and open to new ideas is symbolic of the light of learning: always striving for, never reaching, the fullness of finish.

The University Mace was designed and executed by Regina Kiel, RSM, goldsmith and silversmith. It is a gift of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, Dallas Regional Community.
